Key B - Weekly Highlights

- First phase of the nationwide Measles Follow up Campaign has been concluded in 53 counties with initial coverage of 47% Second phase will start in March.
- As part of COM D-19 preparedness activities, a team of contact tracers have been trained
- Upsurge of Measles cases in Aweil East county
- Increased cases of Hepatitis Einthe Bentiu POC site Rubkona County
- High risk of occurrence of Yellow Fever out break in Kaj o- Keji County
- Over 200 000 beneficiaries have been reached with medical supplies in floods affected areas.

- Overall humanitarian access in the country improved in 2019, according to a new publication by OCHA, partly due to the signing of the revitalized peace agreement in late 2018. Atotal of 535 access incidents were reported, compared to 760 in 2018,
- Estimated 6.5 million South Sudanese will face severe food insecurity bet ween May and July, according to a joint report issued by the government of South Sudan and three UN agencies (WFP, FAO and UNICEF)
- Mature swarms of desert locusts have reported y entered several villages in Magwi and I kotos Counties from neighbouring Uganda nid-February, according to Eastern Equatoria state authorities reported.
- On 21 February, a total of 49 aid workers from 10 NGOs were relocated from Pi bor to Juba as precautionary measure following unconfirmed reports of possible attack on Pi bor town by armed groups
- On 26 February 2020, WHO and partners with support from South Sudan Humanitarian Fund (SSHF) have conducted inter-agency rapid assessment in Mallek village in Rumbek to identify key urgent medical needs of the population following recent inter-communal fighting that resulted into dosure of a Mallek PHCU, destruction of medical supplies and displacement of health workers.
- There has been reported increase in the number of IDPs in Jonglei and Upper NIle State, with over 2 000 in Duk Padiet, and, 380 at Pibor UN MISS (AA) site and, 8 137 individuals in Aburoc IDP site in Fashoda County Upper NIle.
- Over 2 000 internally displaced persons have returned home in Thor Gwang, Manyo county in Upper Nile State.
- Internally displaced persons in Khor Adar In Upper NI e are in need of humanitarian assistance particularly health and WASH.
- Incidents of rape reported in Lasuin Yei County, the perpetrators are soldiers. Survivors have received services with support of a GBV Sub-Cluster partner in Yei.
- Sudan people's Liberation Army in Opposition (SPLA-i Q) forces released 47 women and 26 children to United Nation Mission in South Sudan (UNMISS) in Li-Rangu, Yambi o County.

E mergency Response Activities

Flood response

On 26 February 2020, The WHO Emergency Mobile Medical Team

(EMMT) offered OPD consultations to 58 beneficiaries all children and women in Malek and Apat Rumbek county

- Collectively, over 200 000 beneficiaries have been reached through the medical supplies that have been distributed since the beginning of the flood response.
- Installation of additional cdd chain systemat Pibor county has been completed. The OCV campaign has been put on hold as the current insecurity situation in Pibor is unpredictable.

Emergency Mobile Medical Team(EMMT) Mission in Morobo County, 3to 19 February 2020

■ The team conducted medical consultations and reached 1 445 out patients. trained 49 health care workers on case management, Integrated Disease Surveillance (IDSR) and Infection Prevention and Control (IPC) and donated 48 boxes medical supplies to serve 3 770 people

Nutriti on Response

 WHO trained health workers on the national guideline on severe acute mal nutrition to ensure quality management of severe acute mal nutrition a mong children between 0-59 months in the stabilization centers

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COM D-19) as of 16 February 2020

- As of 1 March 2020, a total of, 87 137 laboratory confirmed and 1 739 new cases have been reported globally. In Chi na 79 968 laboratory confirmed (579 new confirmed and 2 873 deaths (35 new deaths) have been reported.
- Outside of Chi na 7 169 laboratory confirmed (1 160 new) cases and 104 deaths have been reported in 58 countries.
- As of 1 March 2020, Egypt; Algeria and Nigeria are the African countries which reported a confirmed case.

Current preparedness for the risk of COM D-19 in South Sudan

 The Government of South Sudan with support from WHQ, Centre for Disease Control (CDC), and partners continue to dosely monitor COM D- 19 situation in China and other countries.

- Three media briefings held to alert the public about the COM D-19 and the measures instituted by Government and partners to mitigate the risk.
- Health alert notice issued to inform state Ministries of Health, County Health Departments, and health facility workers about the COM D-19 out break.
- Travel health notice issued to provide information to people traveling from China and other affected countries.
- Entry screening intensified in Juba International Airport and ther mo Screening is installed in N mule Port, to identify passengers who travelled from China and other affected countries in the last 14 days for follow up by contact tracing teams.
- Contact trading teams were trained on contact follow up.
- Established a COM D-19 Incident Management Structure in the PHEOC to guide the implementation of the preparedness activities and prepare for the activation of the Emergency Response System should the need arise in addition tα
 - Assessing the national capacities for detecting and responding to COM D-19 to identify main gaps; perfor mrisk assess ments;
 and
 - Develop, implement and monitor time-limited national preparedness plans to enhance capacities for COM D-19 response;
 - Devel op the requisite guidelines to support the
 i mpl e mentation of the COVI D-19 preparedness plans.

Hepatitis Ein Bentiu POC

- On 18 February, health partners have reported increased cases of Hepatitis Einthe Bentiu POC site Rubkona County. Atotal of 44 cases and one death reported in the first six weeks of the year 2020.
- Health and WASH coordinating response to the rising HEV cases in Bentiu PoC. However, the Emergency Preparedness and Response (EP&R) department in the PHEOC is following up with HEV taskforce meeting in Bentiu PoC for prompt intervention.

Yellow Fever Investigation in Kajo-Keji County

- On 22 January 2020, Uganda issued press release on confirmed yellow fever out breaks in 2 districts of Moyo and Bulisa. The two confirmed cases in Moyo district were South Sudanese refugees dealing intrading timber between Uganda and Kajo-Keji in South Sudan.
- On 12 to 18 February, National Rapid Response Team conducted investigations in Kajo-Keji induding Entomological investigations. All 41 samples collected randomly from the areas tested negative for Yellow Fever with PCR Entomological findings suggest that there is high risk of possible YF transmission in Kajo-Keji due to significant presence of YF vector and therefore recommended Yellow Fever vaccination in Kajo-Keji county
- Reports of unusual death of large number of fish in Sakure, Tambura county. WHQ, MbH, and Ministry of Animal Resources and Fisheries is investigating

Me asl es and Rubell a Out breaks

- Phase one of the Country wide measles follow up campaign ended with 962 158 children have been vaccinated in 53 counties. Remaining 27 counties are to be part of phase 2 which will commence on 10 march
- In 2020 measles out breaks confirmed in four counties, Tonj East; Magwi; Bor; Kapoet a East and Tonj South. All these counties are part of phase one measles follow up campaign which started on 4 February 2020.
- Upsurge of measles cases in Aweil East county inspite of reactive campaigns conducted in July 2019 and January 2020. Health duster in states is coordinating response with support from National health duster.
- As of Week, 7, Rubella outbreaks was confirmed in four counties in Lakes state: Wulu, Rumbek Centre; Rumbek East and Yird West and in Leer and Kapoeta East Counties
- Jebel Bomain Pibor county reported 96 measles cases with 11 community deaths. Reactive vaccination campaign started on 26 February 2020 as Jebel Bomais part of the second phase measles follow-up campaign on 10 March 2020.
- In week 08, 2020 IDSR reporting completeness was 87% and timeliness was 84% at health facility level. Both completeness and timeliness for EWARN reporting sites were 85%

- Of the 135 alerts in week 08, 2020; Malaria (30), A WD (38), measles (12) and bloody diarrhea (28) were the top common alerts generated through the E WARS system.
- To strengthen capacities to detect, report, investigate & respond to out breaks & other public health threats in South Sudan, WHO with support from USAID distributed integrated diseases surveillance & response (IDSR) guidelines & tods in Nara, Ezo, Nagero & Tambura
