

HIGHLIGHTS/SITUATION UPDATE (18/01/2021)



- A total of 30995 cases have been recorded to-date, representing 1% of the population.
- More male cases 15685 (51%) were recorded compared to female cases 15310 (49%).
- Of the total confirmed cases, 1478 (5%) Health Workers (HWs) have tested positive for COVID-19 to-date.
 - 1122 (76%) State; 352 (24%) Private, 4 (0.3%) Non-Governmental Organizations.
 - 1238 (84%) recoveries and 6 (0.4%) deaths.
- The recovery rate now stands at 90%.
- All fourteen (14) regions have reported confirmed cases; Khomas and Erongo regions reported the highest with 13684 (44%) and 6553 (21%) respectively.
- Of the total fatalities, 243 (82%) are COVID-19 deaths while 53 (18%) are COVID-19 related deaths.

- To date, 241873 tests (including 10925 re-tests) have been conducted by NIP, Path-Care, NAMDEB, UNAM, Namib Poultry and Central Veterinary laboratories.
- Since the beginning of the outbreak, 56378 contacts of confirmed cases have been identified, 495 new contacts were identified within the last 24 hours from 13 regions.
- Cumulatively, 49968 contacts have completed their monitoring period, while a total of 6746 (22%) contacts of confirmed cases have tested positive.
- Today, 4677 (76%) out of 6149 active contacts monitored.

A highest peak of 3485 (11%) cases was recorded during week 54 (Figure 1).





Figure 2: Age and Sex distribution of COVID-19 confirmed cases, as of 18 January 2021

- As of 18 January 2021
- Of the total confirmed cases, 21449 (69%) are in the 20-49 years age-brackets which constitutes the majority of the recorded cases.
- A total of 3601 (12%) of the confirmed cases are among the 5-19 years category.
- The under 5 years age group make 710 (2%) of the total cases whereas, 1952 (6%) are above 60 years of age.

- Since March 2020, 29447 people have been placed into mandatory quarantine facilities around the country.
- A total of 1972 people are currently in quarantine, with 157 new admissions.

- Public awareness on COVID-19 prevention measures is ongoing.
- > The government and developmental partners continue to prioritise continuation of essential health services.

CHALLENGES

- Lack of isolation units and facilities in the regions.
- Non-adherence to COVID-19 prevention measures by the general public.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Establish fully equipped isolation units and facilities throughout the country.
- Continue to give awareness on the importance of adhering to COVID -19 prevention measures; with the involvement of the Security Cluster.
