






- A total of 31515 cases have been recorded to-date, representing 1% of the population.
- More male cases 15931 (51%) were recorded compared to female cases 15584 (49%).
- Of the total confirmed cases, 1505 (5%) Health Workers (HWs) have tested positive for COVID-19 to-date.
  - 1143 (76%) State; 358 (24%) Private, 4 (0.3%) Non-Governmental Organizations.
  - 1238 (82%) recoveries and 6 (0.4%) deaths.
- > The recovery rate now stands at 93%.
- All fourteen (14) regions have reported confirmed cases; Khomas and Erongo regions reported the highest with 13746 (44%) and 6586 (21%) respectively.
- Of the total fatalities, 254 (82%) are COVID-19 deaths while 56 (18%) are COVID-19 related deaths.

A highest peak of 3485 (11%) cases was recorded during week 54 (Figure 1).

As of 20 January 2021

- To date, 245581 tests (including 11021 retests) have been conducted by NIP, Path-Care, NAMDEB, UNAM, Namib Poultry and Central Veterinary laboratories.
- Since the beginning of the outbreak, 51487 contacts of confirmed cases have been identified, 302 new contacts were identified within the last 24 hours from 12 regions.
- Cumulatively, 51445 contacts have completed their monitoring period, while a total of 6898 (22%) contacts of confirmed cases have tested positive.
- Today, 4485 (76%) out of 5895 active contacts monitored.




Figure 2: Age and Sex distribution of COVID-19 confirmed cases, as of 20 January 2021

- Of the total confirmed cases, 21778 (69%) are in the 20-49 years age-brackets which constitutes the majority of the recorded cases.
- A total of 3672 (12%) of the confirmed cases are among the 5-19 years category.
- The under 5 years age group make 725 (2%) of the total cases whereas, 2001 (6%) are above 60 years of age.
